Recollections of IHBC's Belfast Annual School: by Rachel Kacir from Community Engagement Officer, Glasgow City Heritage Trust

"I was delighted to be awarded a bursary to enable me to attend the IHBC Annual School in Belfast in June. Although Belfast is my home city, it is one that has been transformed since I left 16 years ago to attend university in Glasgow. Although I



have remained in Scotland, my interest in Belfast and Northern Ireland as a whole has endured.

For my undergraduate dissertation I researched the history of the political wall murals in Northern Ireland, charting their history from the early 20th century to the present day. At the time there was a debate around the long term future of these murals. Whilst some argued they were symbols of a violent past and should be painted out, others felt this would literally be 'white washing history' and that they should be retained as an important part of local heritage and also because of their potential to attract tourists. Whilst completing my Masters in Museum Studies I had the opportunity to further explore the legacy of the Troubles, this time analysing how museums in Northern Ireland portray them in the context of the lack of a shared narrative.

Attending the Annual School provided me with the opportunity to learn more about Belfast's built heritage and how the city has been regenerated in recent years, particularly with regards to contested heritage and shared spaces.

The Thursday tour of 'Historic North Belfast' and the Saturday tour of 'Heritage-led regeneration in the north west' were my two highlights of the school. The Thursday tour was led by Shane Quinn of Belfast Buildings Trust and Paula Reynolds of Belfast Charitable Society. It took in everything from an 18th century poorhouse to the largest purpose built Orange Hall in the world!









All the buildings visited on the tour are part of the North Belfast Heritage Cluster, which has received £240,000 in funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund's Great Place Scheme. The Great Place North Belfast project will focus on a one-mile stretch from Donegall Street to Crumlin road, an 'interface' area which is part of the most deprived ward in Northern Ireland. The 15 organisations involved in the cluster will work together to create a heritage-led regeneration plan for the area, putting historic buildings back into sustainable use and creating services and employment for the local community.

The tour included visits to Carlisle Memorial Church and Carnegie Oldpark amongst others. Carlisle Memorial Church was closed in 1982 and by the mid-1990s had fallen into total disuse. The Belfast Buildings Trust acquired the building in 2011 and emergency stabilisation work was completed in 2012, when a structural survey indicated the roof was near to collapse. In June 2015 Phase 1 Capital Works delivered



a permanently repaired roof and temporary internal services, meaning that the building could once again be used by the public. At the time of our visit it had just been announced that the Ulster Orchestra were going to be using the church as a rehearsal and performance space.

Carnegie Oldpark closed as a library over a decade ago, but has now been bought over and will be restored in a project led by the Northern Ireland Foundation, an independent charity. It is hoped that office rentals in the upstairs of the building will provide a commercial revenue stream, enabling the other parts of the building to be free for educational, arts and social uses. Although in a dilapidated state, remnants of the past were still very much evident as we toured the building, including some library books and a set of disco lights in a community room. We were lucky that an art installation by leading Northern Irish artist Rita Duffy was on display when we visited. 'Arachne's Web' featured large crocheted spiders webs creeping up the stairwell of the building.

On Saturday the sun shone gloriously as we boarded the bus and headed to our first stop, the Seamus Heaney Homeplace in Bellaghy. This centre has recently been opened by Mid Ulster District Council and features a moving and very personal interpretive display dedicated to the Nobel prize winning poet. We travelled on to Derry/ Londonderry (known locally as Stroke City!), where Manus Deery from the historic environment division provided an informative tour. We started in Ebrington Barracks, which has a varied military history. It is now operated by the Ilex Urban Regeneration Company and has played host to large scale events, particularly during Derry's time as City of Culture in 2013.

We crossed the River Foyle by way of the Peace Bridge, a physical link between the religiously divided East and West areas of the city. We passed through the magnificent Guild Hall before having a walk along the Derry Walls. Our tour finished at the Bishop's Gate Hotel, a Townscape Heritage Initiative project, where a swift drink was imbibed before we boarded the bus and headed back to Belfast."
