AGM with talk on the restoration of the First White Cloth Hall in Leeds - 5<sup>th</sup> October 2021 at 6.30pm

To start, we are pleased to host Mark Finch, Director of Real Estate, from Rushbond who will talk about the restoration of the First White Cloth Hall in Leeds. The building is located on Kirkgate, Leeds' oldest street, the First White Cloth Hall was built in 1711 for the sale of undyed cloth. In 1758, it was replaced by the Second White Cloth Hall on Meadow Lane. The First White Cloth Hall has been on Historic England's Heritage at Risk Register since 1999.

We will then follow (approx. 7.30pm) with the AGM during which committee members will be elected.

### **Regional News**

### North Yorkshire super council

On 21<sup>st</sup> July, the government decided that the current district councils within North Yorkshire would be replaced by a new, single council for North Yorkshire, with City of York Council remaining as it is. The new council will come into effect in April 2023. Time will tell how this may affect conservation and heritage services, but it is very much hoped that this will be an opportunity for enhanced, rather than reduced, services.

**Multi-million pound building skills programme launches** Historic England and The Hamish Ogston Foundation recently launched a £4.3 million, five-year Hamish

Ogston Foundation Heritage Building Skills Programme. The grant is the largest one-off investment ever awarded to heritage construction training in England.

The aim of the programme is to help address long-term and severe heritage skills shortages in the heritage construction sector. The apprentices will be based with construction firms in the north of England but have the opportunity for additional training on sites undergoing major grant-aided repair. The ambition of the Foundation is to grow the number of trainees and this pilot programme is the first step.

#### **Listed Building Consent Advice Note**

In June, Historic England published Advice Note 16: Listed Building Consent. This is intended to give both general advice for owners of listed buildings about listed building consent as an application process and on how to judge whether proposals need consent, how to achieve certainty on the need for consent and how to make informed applications. It also gives advice on works which may or may not need listed building consent, depending on how the works are proposed to be carried out. ### **Focus on Football Heritage**

Inspired by the 'sterling' efforts of the England football squad in the Euros this summer, here are some interesting facts about Wembley Stadium and two Yorkshire stadiums:

#### **WEMBLEY STADIUM, LONDON**

The current stadium opened in March 2007 and replaced the original Wembley Stadium (*right*); originally named the Empire Stadium, it was built to house the British Empire Exhibition of 1924–25 and was completed in 1923.


Characterised by its famous twin towers, it was built using ferroconcrete

(below right: construction of one of the domed towers, Getty Images).

It hosted the 1948 Olympic games, nearly all FA cup finals from 1923 and the famous 1966 World Cup final.

During construction of the new stadium, excavations uncovered the foundations of Watkin's Tower, an abandoned building project from the 1890s that would have created a metal structure similar to, but taller than the Eiffel Tower, had it been completed.

The stadium was grade II listed in 1976 but such are the pressures for changes to sporting facilities that this did not stop it being demolished to make way for the new stadium.

### **BRAMALL LANE, SHEFFIELD**



The site originates from 1854 when it was laid out as a cricket ground. Sheffield FC (said to be the world's oldest football club) then also started using the ground in 1862. The stadium is now used by Sheffield United FC.

In 1878 it was the venue for the world's first floodlit football match.

Opened in 1902, the John Street Stand (*above*) was designed by prolific football ground architect Archibald Leitch. It was demolished in 1994 and the new stand incorporates a small gable feature to in an attempt to reflect the original stand.

#### **BOOTHAM CRESCENT, YORK**

This was home to York FC since 1932, who have now relocated to a new stadium at Monks Cross on the outskirts of York.

The redevelopment of the site has led to an interesting project with Historic England, looking at how cultural sporting heritage can be used to shape development and play a part in place making, taking into account the significant value that communities place on such sporting venues. The proposed housing development references the former ground by:

- Retention of a section of the tunnel (above), below one of the stands, a rare survival, through which fans swopped ends at half time.
- Retention of the historic boundary wall of the site which pre-date the arrival of York FC.
- Installation of a flag pole which represents the five minute flag lowered 5 mins before the end of the game in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century when ownership of watches was not common.
